Following this incident, the 21st Judicial District's Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) was activated to investigate the uses of force by Deputy Peterson and by you. Following this incident, you were placed on paid administrative leave pending the completion of the CIRT Investigation, the review and decision of District Attorney Dan Rubenstein and the completion of the Professional Standards Unit (PSU) Investigation. On 06/12/24, I was notified that although he had not yet published his written decision, DA Rubenstein had reviewed the CIRT investigation and decided that no criminal charges were going to be filed against you or Deputy Peterson, related to the incident.

Findings:

Understanding that responding to a fellow deputy who is involved in a struggle with a (any) person(s), without knowing the details as to what led to the struggle is a very difficult situation, in my review of the completed investigations, I find your response to and throughout this incident escalated this incident and was not in-line with our office's expectation of professional conduct.

In this incident, I find you violated the following Mesa County Sheriff's Office policies:

MCSO Policy 320 – Standards of Conduct:

320.5.8 - PERFORMANCE

Any act on- or off-duty that brings discredit to this office.

320.5.9 - CONDUCT

g. <u>Use of obscene, indecent, profane or derogatory language while on-duty or in uniform.</u>

MCSO Policy 421 – Body-Worn Camera:

421.6 - ACTIVATION OF THE BODY-WORN CAMERA (CRS 24-21-902)

All agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera recording device will activate the camera immediately upon the following:

- When arriving at a call for service, received through central dispatch or self-dispatched.
- Any self-initiated contact with a member of the public, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law.
- Any other time the deputy feels the recording may transition to a contact, as previously defined.

Aggravating Factors:

In September of 2023, you received a verbal counseling for an incident in which you were working a security assignment at Stocker Stadium for a high school football game. An altercation between students took place and several students were asked to leave the property. One of the students refused to leave, even after District Security Officers told the student they would be charged for trespassing. You subsequently placed the student in handcuffs but never charged the student with trespassing or any other crime; rather, you released the student to their parent(s). You received verbal counseling and

training regarding emotional intelligence and understanding the need for the application of handcuffs.

Discipline:

Your discipline, related to this incident, will be as follows: five (5) days suspension without pay (40.0 hours suspension without pay), to be served by or before 09/09/24, scheduled at the discretion of your captain, Cpt. Eric Sperber.

Appeal Rights:

In this instance, your discipline of five (5) days suspension, without pay, is not specifically appealable by MCSO Policy 1011. None-the-less, I grant you the right to appeal my decision, if you so choose. Any such appeal, must be submitted to Undersheriff King, in writing, no later than 1600 hours on 06/22/24.

Additional Actions:

- Effective immediately, you are being laterally transferred from your Patrol School Resource Officer position to a Patrol Deputy position. Note: This transfer is not a demotion and is not subject to appeal.
- I am ordering you to attend and complete training classes on the following two topics:
 - o De-Escalation
 - Constitutional Use of Force

Note: This ordered training is not subject to appeal.

Conclusion

While I am hopeful for your continued success at the Mesa County Sheriff's Office, it is imperative you understand any future similar incidents will subject you to progressive discipline up to and including termination.

Findings:

In my review of the completed investigations, I find your response to this incident escalated this incident and was not in-line with our office's expectation of professional conduct. I find your response to succeed 's use of the term "nigga," directed towards you, took place after the actual incident you were called to address was by all appearances over. I find your response to so the term "nigga," directed towards you, was avoidable and is what set the escalation of this incident in motion.

In this incident, I find you violated the following Mesa County Sheriff's Office policies:

On April 24, 2024, at Central High School (CHS), you were involved in a Use of Force incident, with a juvenile CHS student, MCSO Case 24-13598. We have requested that the Grand Junction Police Department activate the 21st Judicial District Critical Incident Response Team to conduct a criminal investigation into this incident. Additionally, this incident is being investigated internally, by our Professional Standards Unit.

Effective immediately, you are being placed on paid administrative leave. The fact you are being placed on leave should not be construed to indicate any inference of guilt or innocence, but is done strictly for your protection and protection of the agency pending the outcome of the investigation.

You have the right to retain an attorney, but the attorney cannot he present during any administrative interview. I strongly encourage you to not discuss the details of the incident with anyone other than your attorney, any assigned criminal investigator or the assigned Professional Standards Investigator. You are specifically ordered not discuss the details of the incident with Deputy Phillip Peterson.

During the course of this leave, you are required to be available by telephone (personal cellphone, department issued cellphone or landline) between 0800hrs and 1700hrs Monday through Friday and available to respond to the Sheriff's Office within two hours of notification.

As a part of the administrative leave process, at this time, I will be collecting your ID/proximity card and your department issued firearms.

During the course of this leave, you are not to be at the Sheriff's Office, at Central High School, or at any Sheriff's Office sponsored event unless specifically requested by a member of our Professional Standards Unit, by me or by the Undersheriff.



Investigation Summary:



Through research, I found the MCSO case related to this incident to be: MCSO: 24-13598. In MCSO records systems, this case is labeled as a "Fight" call and the call was officer initiated at 1229 hours on 04/24/24. The only documentation in the call itself is a note entry made by dispatch stating Deputy Michael Hand advised a juvenile male was detained.

and explained that told them prior to the above incident, there were two groups of students fighting in the high school parking lot. told them the fight pertained to another group of kids calling and her group of friends racial slurs, such as, "Beaner and Nigger". Told and and that school principals came out to the parking lot with the SRO's and they broke up the fight and argument. Told me further advised that her group of friends were angry the SRO's weren't charging the other group of kids for calling her group names. Told and that was in her group of friends. Said that's what provoked into calling the SRO a "Niggar".
and told me advised of being pushed by another student during the prior altercation and they wished to pursue charges against the other student, however, they were unaware of who the other student was. I advised and that based on the incident regarding being pushed having occurred at Central High School, there was a very high likelihood of the call being handled by either Deputy Peterson or Deputy Hand as they were the assigned SRO's of that school and both immediately stated they did not wish to speak and/or interact with either of those Deputies. I advised and of these Deputy's supervisor being Sgt. Marco Montez and further explained that they could contact him through dispatch and ask for another Deputy to handle the investigation into being pushed. I explained this was only an option and I could not promise that another Deputy would be assigned to case as that was ultimately going to be up to Sgt. Montez.
and advised they had no further information, and upon being asked, clarified that neither of them were present for the incident(s) and the previously noted information they did have was provided to them by a large of they did have was provided to them by a large of they obtained any further information.
Following my conversation with and and woicemails from citizens began coming into the MCSO regarding the incident. In summary, each of the emails and voicemails all pertained to the respective citizen having seen videos from the incident at Central High School which involved two MCSO Deputies, "using excessive force on a student". Some emails contained videos and others were just the respective citizens voicing their concerns about the incident. Of all the emails with videos, I found that the videos were the same videos which and had previously shared with me; based on this, it appeared these two videos were circulating around the valley. Every email and voicemail was responded to in a semi generic fashion; essentially advising that the MCSO was aware of the incident, we had opened an internal investigation, and asked that anyone with first-hand knowledge of the incident please provide said information. Each and every email and voicemail has been added to this case.

The following morning (04/26/24), MCSO Command staff conducted a meeting which consisted of Sheriff Rowell, Undersheriff King, Public Information Officer Likes, SRO Lieutenant Fogg, SRO Sergeant Montez, and me (PSU Sgt. Montover). We discussed the incident, found that both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand had body-worn camera footage of the incident (although their body-worn cameras were not activated until just before Deputy Peterson's contact and altercation with) and also found that we had additional video footage from a NOLA camera and School District 51 camera. The ultimate discussion revolved around getting all the available camera footage reviewed, redacted per law, and released to the media / public. During the same meeting there was discussion of placing both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand on paid Administrative Leave and it was ultimately determined they would remain on duty, but be temporarily reassigned to different schools. Following this meeting, PIO Likes completed a press release of the incident and this release has been added to this case. This press release also contained content asking that anyone with information pertaining to the aforementioned incident at Central High School please contact the MCSO's Professional Standards Unit either via phone or email.

Over the course of the weekend, (04/27/24 – 04/28/24), several more emails and voicemails came in through either MCSO Command or the MCSO's PSU; all of which were very similar in nature to those previously described, and all of which have been added to this case file.

On 04/29/24, while responding to previously noted emails and voicemails, Division Chief Stoffel asked if I had an estimated timeframe of when I planned on interviewing Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand. I advised at the time I did not as I had not got to that point in my investigation. DC Stoffel directed me to standby on setting up interviews with either Deputy at this time as there was further discussion within MCSO Command about referring the case to either the 21st Judicial District Attorney's Office or the Grand Junction Police Department, for review regarding potential criminal elements.

On 04/30/24 at approximately 1110 hours MCSO Division Chief Smith notified me that MCSO Command staff was formerly reaching out to GJPD Chief Matt Smith in order to request the activation of the 21st Judicial District's Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT). The request of the CIRT was being made in order to have an overall independent investigation / review of the potential criminal aspect of the case. During the afternoon of 04/30/24, I received a CIRT page advised the CIRT was officially being activated for this case and an initial CIRT briefing was set to take place at the GJPD the following day (05/01/24) at 1000 hours. Later in the evening of 04/30/24, DC Smith advised of having meant with both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand, and noted he had officially placed both of them on paid Administrative Leave pending the CIRT investigation, as well as this internal investigation. DC Smith provided me with copies of both Deputy's Administrative Leave letters, as well as audio recordings of the notices. The letters and recordings have been added to this case. I was also notified that MCSO Peer Support was informed of the situation and MCSO Peer Support Sqt. Young was getting both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand connected with Peer Support members, as well as legal representation.

Initial CIRT Briefing Summary (05/01/24 @ 1000 hours):

On 05/01/24 I met with the CIRT team at the GJPD. I was advised GJPD would be leading the CIRT investigation with GJPD Detective Zac McCullough being the lead investigator and GJPD Detective Bryce Raber being the co-lead investigator. Furthermore, I was advised, additional detectives with the GJPD, Palisade Police Department, Fruita Police Department, Colorado Bureau of Investigations, and the 21st Judicial District Attorney's Office would be assisting with the investigation as well.

I briefed the entire CIRT group on the information I had obtained thus far. This information consisted of the previously noted information provided by and and, as well as a very brief review of body-worn camera footage, NOLA footage, School District 51 footage, and through a review of Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's respective reports from the incident. Of note, up and to this point in my investigation, I had not obtained any information under a Garrity advisement, or any kind of presumption thereof – because of this, and the fact most if not all, information about the incident thus far had come through me, I was the one who briefed the group.

Following my briefing to the CIRT group, GJPD Detective Sgt. Chavira and GJPD Detective McCullough began administering tasks to all respective investigators; which included arranging interviews with Central High School staff members, parents and students involved in the incident, and any other witnesses whom they deemed to be pertinent to the investigation. During this process, Sgt. Chavira advised he would find out who Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's legal representation was and in turn reach out to their legal counsel to arrange for their respective interviews.

On 05/02/24, GJPD Sgt. Chavira advised the next CIRT briefing would take place at the GJPD, on Monday (05/06/24) at 1000 hours.

As I awaited this second CIRT briefing, I began compiling and reviewing all available information related to this incident; to include case file(s) and all applicable and available video footage.

MCSO Deputy (SRO) Phillip Peterson's Case Report (MCSO: 24-13598):

Case Status: Closed / Prosecution Declined


On 04/24/2024 at approximately 1229hrs. I Deputy P. Peterson was working as the School Resource Officer at Central High School, located at 550 Warrior Way, Grand Junction, Mesa County, CO, 81504. While working as the School Resource Officer, I was advised via school radio of a large crowd in the parking lot out front of the school

and that they were possibly fighting. I responded to the front parking lot and observed a large crowd of Juvenile Students. A Central High School staff member was already on site and had broken up the crowd and stated it was a verbal altercation only, and that nothing physical had happened.

School Administrators were also on scene, and knew one of the involved females to cause issues. When staff observed that female student near a vehicle they asked for the SRO's to assist as they expected the female to be confrontational. While walking to the vehicle where the female was, I heard a group of students behind me yelling "hit her , Hit her". I was unsure if the group was attempting to get the female to strike the School Administrator or someone else, but they were actively trying to provoke a violent response. I turned to the group and told them to "knock it off". One of the males stated to me "what, what". I turned around to continue towards the female student, when the male stated "what, nigga". I believed this male to be attempting to provoke violence within the group of students. I approached the male and asked him what he had said. He responded "what", and I asked what he said after that, then then said "nigga". I had established probable cause for Disorderly Conduct at this point and told the male to begin walking towards the front office as my intention was not to charge him, but separate him from the crowd and alleviate the issue.

I placed my right hand on the males back to direct him towards the front doors of the school. When I placed my hand on his back, the male pulled away and stated "don't fucking touch me". It should be noted that the male kept his hands in his pockets and I did not know if he had a weapon person, but due to the male's uncooperative nature I believed it best to detain him in handcuffs for my safety and his. When he pulled away, I quickly closed the distance between us and grabbed hold of his upper collar with my right hand, and his left wrist with my left hand to gain positive control of him and not allow him to pull away from me again as I was unsure if he would attempt to fight me or try to flee. As soon as I grabbed hold of his left hand he instantly pulled his hands from his pocket and began to pull away from me again. I used a balance displacement technique to bring the male off balance and brought him to the ground in an attempt to gain positive control of the male. While on the ground he continued to pull away from me, and I was able to grab hold of his right arm with my right hand. I gave the male several verbal commands to "stop", but he continued to pull away, yelling at me to get off him. At this point Deputy M. Hand arrived to assist me and unholstered his Taser. Deputy Hand game the male a verbal warning to quit fighting or he would be tased. The male then complied and rolled onto his stomach and placed his hands behind his back to allow me to handcuff him.

The male was immediately asked if he was injured and he responded "no". I picked the male up and escorted him to the front Office. I asked the male what his name was and he stated he would not answer any questions until his grandmother arrived. I stepped out of the Office to see if Administration could Identify the student so his guardian could be contacted, and Administration identified him as When I walked back into the Office with , his Grandmother had already called If I could speak to her and he allowed me to use his his cellphone. I asked phone to speak with his grandmother identified as explained the series of events and how they unfolded to on the phone and she was not raised to be disrespectful or was very understanding. stated confrontational with Law Enforcement.





It should be noted that I was wearing my department-issued Axon Body Worn Camera (S/N: X60333921) during this contact. The camera completed an automatic function check upon startup at the beginning of my shift, there were no errors during the function check, and the camera was functioning normally. The following is not verbatim, but my recollection of events and statements during the contact.

On April 24, 2024, at approximately 1210 hours, I, Deputy Hand, was working as assigned SRO at Central High School located at 550 Warrior Way in Mesa County, Colorado I was notified by an unknown student there was a large fight going on in the parking lot of Central High School. I proceeded outside with Deputy Peterson. Interim Assistant Principal Vern McGee (DOB 06/13/64) was also present and walking outside to address the fight.

When we arrived outside there was a large group of students at the east end of the school across from the weight room. It appeared that the fight had broken up but there was still some back-and-forth verbal argument going on between two groups of students. Teachers and school administrators also began showing up. I saw Clint Trujillo (DOB

The road approximately ¼ of the way from the left side of the photo which runs north, and south is 31 Road. The "green" highlighted box encompasses the Central High School property.

Logistical / Background Information Regarding Video Footage Review:

As mentioned above, both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand were wearing their agency issued AXON Body 4; body-worn cameras during this incident. Both body-worn cameras appeared to be operating as designed and configured. Of note, based on how the MCSO's body-worn cameras are currently configured, upon activation, the cameras capture the previous thirty seconds of video footage; however, during this first thirty seconds, the recording only captures video footage and they do not capture an audio recording. At the thirty second mark, or the moment the body-worn camera was activated, the body-worn camera(s) then begin to capture both video and audio footage.

As also mentioned above, upon request, the MCSO Intel Unit was able to provide me with video footage from the Community Safety Camera (NOLA Camera) as well as the School District 51 camera. Both of these cameras are affixed to the south facing wall of Central High School; and on this particular wall, the cameras are located at an elevation near the roof of the building and just to the east of the main entrance of the school. For clarity purposes, these two cameras are also designed to only capture video footage and do not capture audio recordings.

 footage all contain date / time markers, and upon my initial review I found that all of their date / time markers were accurate and consistent with one another.

The following is a summary / compilation of my overall review of all previously noted camera footage. All noted footage has also been added to this internal case.

Unless otherwise noted, all of the following time stamps occurred on 04/24/24.

Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera was manually activated by Deputy Peterson depressing its activation button at 12:26:49. With this in mind, coupled with the above noted details about the body-worn camera configurations themselves, Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera began video recording at 12:26:19, and it began capturing both video and audio upon its activation at 12:26:49.

Deputy Hand's body-worn camera was activated via his taser sensor at 12:26:54; meaning Deputy Hand's body-worn camera automatically activated once he removed his taser from its holster and turned his taser on. Again, with Deputy Hand's taser activation automatically activating his body-worn camera at 12:26:54, coupled with these body-worn cameras being configured in a manner which video record the thirty seconds prior to being activated and then both video and audio record from the time of activation forward, Deputy Hand's body-worn camera began video recording at 12:26:24, and it began capturing video and audio upon its activation at 12:26:54.

Please note; as mentioned above, Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand were wearing MCSO issued AXON Body 4 body-worn cameras during this incident. These cameras are currently configured in a manner which record thirty frames a second; meaning there are thirty frames within each second of body-worn camera footage.

Each time stamp in the following portion of this investigative summary is preceded by one or more of the following: "BWC, NOLA, SD 51, Student". This is done in a manner to describe which video footage was used to obtain the specific detail at the specific noted time. The timestamp is then followed by a description of what was observed at that specific timestamp.

Review of all Available Camera Footage (BWC / Student / NOLA / SD 51):

(NOLA) - 12:19:27 – Students were beginning to form two groups in front of and between an older model red colored Jeep Cherokee and newer model green colored Jeep Cherokee; both of which were located / parked in the two most north eastern parking spots of the main Central High School parking lot.

(NOLA) - 12:19:55 – The two groups each seemed to increase in size and although there is no audio, it's clear there was some kind verbal altercation taking place between the groups. This observation / conclusion was drawn because during this time there were several other unrelated students walking through the parking lot in a north and north eastern direction as they appeared to be in route back to class from their lunch period: (Tuesday thru Friday: Central High School's lunch period goes from 11:33-12:18). While the other students were walking through the parking lot, even without audio, it's clear they began to look towards and/or focus their attention on the two groups of students formed around the previously mentioned vehicles in the parking lot.

(NOLA) - 12:21:50 – The verbal altercation between the two groups in the parking lot seemed to intensify to a physical altercation as some of the students appeared to shoved each other. Based on a later obtained description / identification of (white colored shirt and black colored leggings), it appeared either bumped or pushed, but it's difficult to tell as there are other students between her and the camera view at the time. However, at 12:21:51, was then seen shoving what appeared to be a male student who was wearing black colored pants and a black colored shirt. Over the next thirty seconds or so, it appeared there was more pushing and shoving going on between the two groups of students either in front of or between the previously noted vehicles. As this was occurring, several other students who were otherwise just walking normally east bound on the sidewalk or north bound through the parking lot appeared to approach and encircle the two groups by the vehicles. Again, it's difficult to tell based on the distance from the camera to the two groups in the parking lot, but around 12:22:34, it appeared as if there were roughly 20-25 students in the immediate vicinity of the same previously noted vehicles.

(NOLA) - 12:23:26 – Several of the otherwise unrelated students who approached the two groups as they were partaking in the altercation by the vehicles began to disperse. As those students were dispersing, I noticed some of the original students from the initial two groups were also beginning to disperse from the immediate area in front of and between the two vehicles. As the students were moving away from the immediate area around the two vehicles, I noticed they all seemed to stay within their groups, but rather just left the area in a manner as to where they weren't so congested around the vehicles.

(NOLA) - 12:24:22 – A male CHS staff member, later identified as William "Vern" McGee (wearing jeans and a black colored polo) entered the lower right hand camera view and walked east bound from what is assumed to be the front of the school towards the north east corner of the parking lot where the same two previously noted groups of students were arguing. As Vern was walking in the direction of the students, those two groups seemed to disperse even more so.

(NOLA) - 12:24:31 – Deputy Hand entered the same lower right hand camera view and walked in the same east bound direction as Vern. As Deputy Hand entered the camera view, he appeared to be approximately 20-30 feet behind Vern, and both continued walking towards were the previously noted groups had been arguing.

(NOLA) - 12:24:33 – Deputy Peterson entered the same lower right hand camera view and followed Deputy Hand as both proceeded east bound and slightly south east bound towards where the two groups had been arguing. As Deputy Peterson was following Deputy Hand, Deputy Peterson remained slightly to the north / left side of Deputy Hand.

(NOLA) - 12:24:53 – As Vern approached the area where the two groups had been arguing, there were only a few students left in the immediate area. Vern then turned back towards Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson and seemed to motion to them requesting that they speak with another male CHS staff member, later identified as Clint Trujillo (wearing dark colored shorts, dark colored long sleeve shirt, and dark colored tennis shoes) who was standing on the sidewalk on the north side of the fire lane. The fire lane separates the main parking lot from the lawn and sidewalk area which run parallel to the front of the school. Clint had initially entered the parking lot from the gym / weight room of the campus area which is located near the east side of the school.

(NOLA) – 12:25:00 – Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson both meant up with Clint. Again, without audio, it's difficult to tell what was said between Clint and both Deputies, however it appeared Clint was telling both Deputies what had taken place regarding the two previously noted groups arguing. This assumption is based on the fact that as the staff member was talking with both Deputies, the staff member would periodically point towards where the two groups were arguing and then randomly point towards other students walking back towards the school.

(NOLA) – 12:25:18 – A female CHS staff member, later identified as Assistant Principal Shauna Hobbs (wearing jeans and a dark colored polo shirt) entered the lower right portion of the camera view. Shauna appeared to come from the same direction of the main entrance of the school and as she moved through the camera view she walked east bound towards where the initial altercation had taken place.

(NOLA) – 12:25:21 – Vern appeared to direct the remaining students to leave the immediate area. As the students were beginning to walk away, Shauna was observed using her right hand to motion for the students to come to her. From what I can tell, it appeared five students from one of the initial groups began walking west bound towards the main entrance of the school; based on descriptions and later identification, two members of this group walking back towards the main entrance and Shauna were and Shauna were and Shauna were altercation, Vern proceeded to look around the vehicles in the immediate area of where the altercation took place.

(NOLA) – 12:25:36 – The previously mentioned students, including and which was a work with the state of the fire lane. At this time, Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson were still on or near the same sidewalk, approximately 30 feet to the east of where Shauna was located with the other students.

(NOLA) – 12:25:58 – Shauna walked to the east side of the groups of students she was in contact with and appeared to motion towards Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson. Due to students being between Shauna and the camera view I cannot tell what Shauna's motion was, but it's clear she was able to get Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson's attention as they immediately began walking west bound towards her and the group of students she was in contact with.

(NOLA) – 12:26:01 – Clint broke contact with Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson and appeared to begin walking back to the gym / weight room area of the school. Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson then began walking towards Shauna who was in contact with approximately seven students on the side walk. Again, without audio, it's difficult to tell what was being said, but it appeared was very agitated and upset with Shauna as began throwing her arms up in the air while standing in front of and looking at Shauna.

(NOLA) – 12:26:03 – Once Shauna captured Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson's attention and they began walking towards her, she appeared to turn and begin walking west bound back towards the main entrance of the school. As Shauna was walking away

from the group of students, appeared to continue to argue with her and throw her hands up in the air as if she wasn't happy about their conversation.


(NOLA) – 12:26:08 – Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson approached the group of students Shauna was just speaking with and both Deputies continued walking west bound past the students. The students were standing on the sidewalk, and due to there being approximately six of them, they were taking up nearly the entire sidewalk. Deputy Peterson walked out into the fire lane and around the south side of the group of students and Deputy Hand proceeded to remain on the sidewalk and walked west bound, directly through the students. There were no abrupt movements by Deputy Hand or any of the students as Deputy Hand proceeded through the group. Although the distance from the camera to where the students were located is substantial, these observations lead me to believe Deputy Hand did not make any kind of physical contact with any of the students on the sidewalk as he passed though them.


(NOLA) – 12:26:14 – As both Deputies passed the students on the sidewalk and continued walking west bound towards the main entrance of the school, Deputy Hand was in front of Deputy Peterson by a few feet.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) - 12:26:16 - As both Deputies continued walking west bound on the sidewalk, Deputy Peterson abruptly turned to his left. Deputy Peterson didn't completely turn around and face east bound, but more so seemed to turn to his left enough to where his upper body was facing southeast and his head was facing east. As Deputy Peterson turned towards the group of students, Deputy Hand continued walking west bound towards the main entrance of the school. Once turned, Deputy Peterson appeared to verbally interact with the same students from the group on the sidewalk that both Deputies had just passed by. It's difficult to tell which member(s) of the group Deputy Peterson was verbally interacting with at the time as none of them seemed to be making any gestures, and again there is no audio captured on any of the footage at this time. While turned around and verbally interacting with the group of students, Deputy Peterson waved his left arm out to his side, but at this time it's unknown what his purpose behind doing this was. During this same timeframe, Deputy Peterson's bodyworn camera began capturing the thirty second video recording prior to being manually activated. Again, this thirty second window only captured video footage without any audio recording. Of note, cell phone video appeared to begin recording just as Deputy Peterson had waved his left arm out to his side while having a verbal video started, and captured Deputy interaction with the group of students. As Peterson slightly facing them with his left arm waved out to his side, her video also captured Deputy Peterson stating "okay". At this time, it's unknown what or who he was saying "okay" to.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:23 – Deputy Peterson appeared to complete his verbal interaction with the group of students, turned around to his right and proceeded to continue walking west bound towards the main entrance of the school.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:25 – 12:26:32 – Deputy Peterson had taken approximately three steps west bound, at which point was heard saying, "Who cares Nigga". Deputy Peterson immediately stopped walking west bound and again abruptly turned to his left and this time he turned his entire body around, facing east bound on the sidewalk. As Deputy Peterson turned and began facing the group of students who were east of him, he stated, "What"? Deputy Peterson also began

Again, this screenshot depicts the portion of the incident when Deputy Peterson was pulling off balance, to his right, and ultimately to the ground.




(BWC) – 12:26:39 – At four frames into 12:26:39, on Deputy Peterson's body-worn appeared to be almost completely pulled to the ground. At that same time. Deputy Peterson's right hand appeared to be slightly opened up and positioned in throat, but not against his throat. In the same frame, Deputy Peterson's left arm was laid over top of left shoulder and his left forearm and left hand were resting on, or pushing against the left side of chest. When watching the video though, without pausing and without slowing it down, it appeared as though Deputy Peterson was using his left arm to apply pressure to his right arm and neck and throat. However, upon breaking Deputy hand which was closer to Peterson's body-worn camera footage down by frames; although the gap between his left forearm and right hand appears to be very small and almost non-existent, there does not appear to be any pressure marks or indentations on Deputy Peterson's left forearm from the knuckles of his right hand; which indicates there's no pressure being applied from Deputy Peterson's left forearm against his right hand.

The following screen shot was taken from Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera at the fourth frame into the 12:26:39 time stamp. This screenshot helps depict the previously noted descriptions of where Deputy Peterson's hands and arms were.



The following screen shot was taken from the video footage recorded by and provided to me by and . Again, although there isn't a timestamp on this footage / screenshot; when the very same movement's and placements are compared against NOLA footage and Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera footage. I can confidently say this screenshot was taken between the eighth and twelfth frame of Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera footage at 12:26:39. During these specific frames on Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera, his cameras view is significantly obstructed by the back of head due to and upper torso being pulled so close to Deputy Peterson's upper body where his bodyworn camera was attached to his vest. Because of this, the most applicable view of the incident at this time is from the footage recorded by . This specific screenshot depicts the timeframe of when Deputy Peterson has the entire lower portion of body on the ground and is just starting to rotate upper torso towards the ground as well. Of note, as this is taking place, Deputy Peterson's right hand and wrist still appear to be positioned around the front of neck and throat area and, due to the poor quality of video footage, there's no indicators to tell how much, if any neck and/or throat area at this time. At the same pressure is being applied to time, Deputy Peterson's left arm, forearm, and hand still remained over top of left shoulder; however Deputy Peterson's left hand at this time is wide open and resting upper right chest area. From what I can tell, and based on the totality of motions, it appears as though Deputy Peterson was attempting to use his left arm, forearm, and hand as a buffer between upper body and the ground; essentially trying to prevent chest from contacting the ground directly.




(BWC) – 12:26:40 – As Deputy Hand was approaching the stairs leading up to the front entrance of Central High School, he was following Shauna Hobbs and the female students she was escorting into the office. As they approached the stairs, Shauna and both girls quickly turned their heads and bodies to their right (east bound) and one of the students began pointing to the east. Based on the timing and direction of where the female student was pointing and the others were looking, this appeared to be the time when they were looking back towards Deputy Peterson as he was pulling

to the ground; this is also the same time frame when loudly yelling statements along the lines of "you're being recorded". Deputy Hand's bodyworn camera is activated during this timeframe, however it's still within the thirty second window of only recording video and not audio. Based on Deputy Hands movements, it appeared as though he began turning his head to the right, in the same direction Deputy Peterson was located and the same direction the female students and Shauna were looking.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) - 12:26:40 - 12:26:42 - Deputy Peterson rotated torso to the right and down towards the ground. As began to face the ground, he () placed his right hand out and onto the ground. then used his right hand to push back against Deputy Peterson. This is only visible and derived based on the fact that body is otherwise going to the ground in a steady, constant manner, up and to the point his right hand comes into contact with the ground, at which point there appears to be some type of force, which is significant enough to drastically alter the steady rate at which was going to the ground at. Not only did this force just alter rate of going to the ground, there appeared to be enough force applied to right arm and hand that caused his torso to not even fully go to the ground. While watching the video(s) all the way through without pausing. this portion of the incident initially appeared to be possibly attempting to brace himself from hitting the ground; however, upon breaking the videos down by frame, it's intention was not only to potentially brace himself, but to also prevent Deputy Peterson from completely taking him to the ground in the first place. As was applying this force to the ground via his right hand, Deputy Peterson's upper body seemed to continue towards the ground as Deputy Peterson's upper body completely slid over top of head and Deputy Peterson ultimately had to remove his right hand and arm from around chest and place it on the ground, out in front of in order to prevent him (Deputy Peterson) from completely falling to the ground himself.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:42 – Approximately ten to twenty frames into this time marker is when Deputy Peterson regained his own balance, pulled his own body back overtop of and then slid his (Deputy Peterson's) left hand and arm over top of left shoulder and ultimately across chest in a horizontal direction and his left hand ultimately stopped and appeared to grab onto the area around right armpit.


(BWC) – 12:26:43 – After turning and visually acknowledging the altercation Deputy Peterson was having with towards Deputy Peterson.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:43 – 12:26:45 – As was in a seated position and Deputy Peterson was kneeled behind him, it seemed as though continued to try to stand up by pressing his body back towards Deputy Peterson. As was pressing his body back towards Deputy Peterson, the back of head seemed to be rubbing against the center of Deputy Peterson's chest which ultimately caused Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera to fall off his vest and onto the

ground just to the right of where was seated. As Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera became detached from his vest it appeared as though Deputy Peterson could feel something moving around between his body and head / body, because Deputy Peterson immediately began looking down at his chest and subsequently pulled chest and began using his right hand to grab onto or his right hand away from catch his body-worn camera as it was falling. Of note, during this incident, Deputy Peterson was wearing an MCSO issued body-worn camera mount which attaches the body-worn camera to his uniform via four magnets. While Deputy Peterson's body-worn camera was falling, he had his right hand and arm wedged over top of, around the front, and underneath right arm; as if Deputy Peterson was using his right arm to control right arm.

The following screen shot was taken from the video footage recorded by and provided to me by and another. This screen shot depicts the moment when Deputy Peterson noticed his body-worn camera was falling off and he looked down and began trying to use his left hand to catch it. 

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:48 – 12:26:54 – Once Deputy Peterson was able to locate and grab a hold of his body-worn camera, he began trying to depress the activation button, which he was successfully able to do at 12:26:49. As Deputy Peterson was trying to pick his body-worn camera back up, appeared to keep trying to push against Deputy Peterson. While Deputy Peterson was trying to grab his body-worn camera off the ground using his right hand, it allowed right arm and hand to become free. Deputy Peterson grabbed his body-worn camera from the ground and started the motion as if he was going to reattach it to his vest, however, as Deputy Peterson retrieved the body-worn camera from the ground, proceeded to use his right hand to press on the ground which appeared to be his way of trying to stand back up. Deputy Peterson then placed his body-worn camera closer to his right knee and proceeded to use his right hand to grab a hold of right hand as was still trying to use his right hand to push off the ground and stand up. As was doing this, he was able to lift his buttocks off the ground but still couldn't seem to fully stand up due to Deputy Peterson's left arm being overtop of left shoulder and ultimately across chest. Deputy Peterson seemed to have applied

enough downward pressure to left shoulder to prevent after the from being able to get to his feet.

(NOLA / BWC / Student Footage) – 12:26:54 – As Deputy Hand got within a few steps of Deputy Peterson and the pointing it in the direction of the ground with his right hand and activated his taser, was still pressing off the ground with his right hand and attempting to stand up and Deputy Peterson was using his right hand to pull right hand off the ground so couldn't utilize his right hand to brace himself and attempt to stand back up.

Deputy Hand pointed his taser towards torso area and yelled, "Lay down, you better lay down on the ground right now, I will, I will tase you, get down on the ground". As Deputy Hand was yelling this, his voice appeared to be extremely heightened and direct. As Deputy Hand was yelling at to get on the ground, Deputy Peterson was still right hand off the ground to break his balance. Deputy attempting to pull Peterson also still had his left arm across chest and his left hand was reached out towards right shoulder. When this portion of the incident is viewed by the video footage recorded by , who was standing to the east of the incident, it appeared Deputy Peterson's left arm and inner elbow area were squeezed around neck. However, when this same portion of the incident is viewed by Deputy Hand's body-worn camera who is standing directly in front of and Deputy Peterson, as well as the footage recorded by who was standing

slightly to the west of Deputy Hand; one can see that Deputy Peterson's left arm was stretched across upper chest area and his left hand was reached out towards the outside of right shoulder. During this timeframe, immediately appeared to stop trying to stand up, and it seemed as though stopped resisting Deputy Peterson. Deputy Peterson was subsequently able to get body rotated towards the ground and ultimately placed on his stomach on the ground. > The following screen shot was taken from Deputy Hand's body-worn camera as Deputy Hand was standing in front of Deputy Peterson and , and pointing his chest and stomach area. 






Deputy Hand then subsequently used his radio and generated a call for service through dispatch. (BWC) – 12:29:13 – Deputy Peterson pulled out a notepad and asked , "What's your name, partner"? replied, "I don't answer questions". Deputy Peterson replied, "You're not going to answer questions, huh"? replied, "Nope, not until you contact my grandmother, my guardian". Deputy Peterson replied, "Well alright". replied, "Appreciate it". (BWC) – 12:30:40 – Deputy Peterson stepped out of the administrator office was in and contacted Administrator Ryan Whittington and began talking to him about ; specifically, Deputy Peterson informed Administrator Whittington that wasn't identifying himself. Of note, at this point, neither Deputy Peterson nor Deputy Hand knew who (BWC) – 12:32:15 – Deputy Peterson walked back into the administrator office where was located and found to be talking on his cell phone to his grandma. The phone was on a "speaker phone" setting, meaning the conversation was heard fairly clearly and not just through the earpiece of the phone. had removed his phone from his pocket, placed it on his lap and called was still in handcuffs at this time. Deputy Peterson confirmed with he was talking with his grandma and asked to have his grandma come to the told Deputy Peterson she was coming to the school, but she was school. coming from Fruita so it would be a little bit. continued speaking with his grandma on the phone while Deputy Peterson stood inside the same office. (BWC) - 12:33:43 - While was still on the phone with his grandma, Deputy Peterson asked if he could talk with her. overheard Deputy Peterson's request and stated, "Yes, let me talk to him". Prior to starting to speak with Deputy Peterson, told , "And you be respectful and say thank you". (BWC) – 12:33:51 – Deputy Peterson reached for cell phone as it was still if it was okay that he grabbed the placed on his lap and while doing so asked stated it was and Deputy Peterson then picked the phone up and began talking with . The phone remained on the speaker phone setting and Deputy Peterson remained in the same room and just a few feet away from call. Deputy Peterson introduced himself to over the phone and they began talking about the incident in its entirety. Once Deputy Peterson informed of the incident asked to speak with and situation pertaining to again. Deputy Peterson handed the phone to and began verbally disciplining him for his involvement in the situation(s) themselves, as well as his actions and comments towards Deputy Peterson. if he "Would mind if the nurse just checked him out real quick".





(BWC) – 12:42:38 – Deputy Peterson asked Deputy Hand to step into an unoccupied administrator office. Both stepped into an office and Deputy Hand closed the door as Deputy Peterson began talking. Deputy Peterson stated, "So yeah, talked to his grandma on the phone. Super fucking ally for us, so she's, she bitching him out, like you said what, you pulled away from a cop when he tried to put his hands on you, you told him to get his fucking hands off you, you called him Nigga, you did all this, do it again, see what the fuck happens. Now I gotta go fucking make an excuse to my boss why I gotta leave, oh yeah". Deputy Peterson briefly stopped speaking with Deputy Hand at that point as a school administrator knocked on the door to provide Deputy Peterson with a student face sheet (school documentation containing a student's identifying information and parent / guardian information). Once the administrator handed the student face sheet to Deputy Peterson, Deputy Hand closed the door. Deputy Peterson then stated to Deputy Hand, "Yeah, super fucking helpful and she understands". Deputy Hand then replied, "Sorry bro, I had turned my back and I turned around and that's when I came over and was like okay we're going, we're going straight". Deputy Peterson then cut Deputy Hand off and began talking again, stating, "Well ultimately what happened was that they kept, like, swing on her swing on her , swing on her, whenever we were walking over to make contact there. So I turned around and said hey, knock it off, what are you doing, what are you doing, and then like as soon, and he was like what what what, I was like dude knock it off and I went to turn around and he's he's like what Nigga. And I said, what'd you say to me? It's what, I said what. And I started walking that way and I said, no, what'd you say after that cause you said something after that. He said I said Nigga. So I said come on, let's go to the office. And I went to put my hand on him like this and he said get your fucking hands off of me. The moment he did it I grabbed him lets go. You don't fucking pull away from me bud, sorry. Sorry sorry". Deputy Hand then began telling Deputy Peterson about what was saying to him in the office about Deputy Peterson putting hands on was just trying to be a tough Deputy Peterson said it sounded like guy on camera.


(BWC) – 12:45:49 – Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand completed their conversation and exited the office they were in. Deputy Hand proceeded into the main administration office area where he began communicating with school administrators and seemed to be collecting identifying information for the students involved in the above noted incident(s); and Deputy Peterson proceeded to the SRO office.

(BWC) – 12:46:44 – Deputy Peterson deactivated his body-worn camera while inside the SRO office. Of note, Deputy Peterson was the only one inside the SRO office at that time.

(BWC) – 12:50:13 – As Deputy Hand was speaking with school administrators, two female students were being escorted through the office and began looking at Deputy Hand and laughing as they walked by. These were the same two female students outside of the school who Administrator Shauna Hobbs had escorting into the office before Deputy Hand turned around to go assist Deputy Peterson. While they were laughing, Deputy Hand stated, "Keep it up ladies, and I'll see that you're charged with everything I can throw at you, I promise you that. I promise you". The two female students continued walking away. Deputy Hand continued speaking with school administrators.

CIRT Briefing Summary (05/06/24 @ 1000 hours):

On 05/06/24 at 1000 hours I attended the second CIRT briefing at the GJPD. During this briefing, GJPD Detective and CIRT co-lead investigator, Bryce Raber facilitated the meeting.

I was advised during the timeframe between the last CIRT briefing (05/01/24) and this current one, CIRT investigators had been able to interview all involved Central High School administrators and staff members. Det. Raber also advised all but just a few students who were involved in the initial altercation in the parking lot, or witnesses to Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's interaction with been interviewed.

I was informed that Deputy Hand had retained legal counsel through Front Line Law out of Denver, Colorado and his respective attorney was Alejandro Fernandez (720-282-1266).

I was further informed that Deputy Peterson had retained legal counsel through Foster Graham Milstein & Calisher and his respective attorney was Mallory Revel (303-333-9810).

Det. Raber advised they had placed calls into both Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson's respective attorney's and they were just awaiting a response as to whether or not either Deputy would be participating in an interview with CIRT investigators. Det. Raber also advised upon contacting and his grandma / guardian, both informed CIRT investigators they had retained attorney James Roberts with Scott Palmer Law out of Addison, Texas as civil and legal counsel for the incident. Det. Raber advised CIRT investigators had a message into Attorney Roberts regarding being able to interview and they were just awaiting his response.

During this same CIRT briefing, GJPD Commander Freidenberger advised the CIRT group that GJPD Commander Robert Fisher was also going to be asked to conduct a review of Deputy Peterson's use of force on the GJPD's "expert" instructors regarding use of force, arrest control, and defensive tactics. Commander Freidenberger advised she herself was the GJPD Subject Matter Expert (SME) for use of force, however, due to her being the Commander over this CIRT investigation, she felt it necessary to have another

expert review the case from a use of force standpoint. Commander Fisher was subsequently provided with all applicable reports and video footage from the incident.

Following this CIRT briefing, on 05/07/24 at approximately 1636 hours, GJPD Sergeant Matt Mecum sent me an email advising he had just received a phone call from Deputy Peterson's attorney, Mallory Revel with Foster Graham Milstein & Calisher. Sgt. Mecum advised while discussing the case and the probability of Deputy Peterson providing a statement to the CIRT investigators, Mallory explained she had been informed that Deputy Peterson had completed a case report for the incident. Sgt. Mecum confirmed that to be factual, at which point Mallory asked to be able to view Deputy Peterson's case report. Sgt. Mecum advised he did not have the ability to send Mallory the case file, and/or Deputy Peterson case report, therefore he asked that I send it. A short time later, I sent both Mallory and Sgt. Mecum a copy of the entire case file which contained Deputy Peterson's case report. Mallory responded to the email within a few minutes advising she had received the case file. This entire email conversation has been added to this internal case.

CIRT Command Briefing Summary (05/08/24 @ 0900 hours):

On 05/09/24 at 0900 I attended the CIRT Command briefing at the GJPD. This briefing was hosted for the purposes of informing command members of all agencies involved in the CIRT investigation of the progress / status of the investigation. This CIRT briefing was facilitated by GJPD Sgt. Matt Mecum and GJPD Det. and CIRT lead investigator, Zach McCullough.

During the same Command CIRT briefing, Sgt. Mecum notified everyone present that Deputy Hand's attorney, Alejandro Fernandez had reached back out to him the previous day (05/07/24) and advised Deputy Hand would not be providing a statement / interview to CIRT investigators.

Sgt. Mecum advised he was still awaiting a response from Deputy Peterson's attorney as to whether or not he would be providing a statement / interview to CIRT investigators.

Commander Freidenberger and Sgt. Mecum also requested any available records regarding Deputy Peterson's prior law enforcement experience and/or training experience he had before becoming employed with the MCSO. Of note, Deputy Peterson began his employment with the MCSO on 03/08/2021. Following this CIRT briefing, MCSO Lieutenant Prunty provided both Commander Freidenberger and Sgt. Mecum with all of the training information which Deputy Peterson had provided to the MCSO during his hiring process. Lt. Prunty also provided the following information / timeline of Deputy Peterson previous law enforcement experience:

- August 2006 August 2011 Military Police USMC Camp Lejeune, NC
- October 2011 June 2012 Dallas County SO Detentions Deputy
- April 2013 March 2015 Dallas PD Police Officer
- October 2015 February 2021 Corpus Christi PD Police Officer

A short time after this Command CIRT briefing concluded, Sgt. Mecum forwarded me an email which he had just received from Deputy Peterson's attorney, Mallory Revel. The following is copy and pasted from Mallory's email and the entire email has been added to this internal case.

Hi Matt,

Deputy Peterson would like to submit the attached supplement to his previously submitted report. He would decline an interview at this time. If there is anything I can do to assist in the process, please don't hesitate to reach out. Thank you!

Deputy Peterson's supplemental report which Mallory referenced is copy and pasted below. This supplemental report has also been added to both this internal case as well as the MCSO case file.

I, Phillip Wayne Peterson, am submitting this supplemental statement in reference to the incident that occurred on April 24, 2024 at Central High School. This statement is intended to serve as a supplement to my previously submitted report.

When I placed my right arm around the male's shoulder, my purpose was to pull him close to me in order to prevent him from continuing to pull away from me. At no point in time did I place my arm around his neck. Rather, I placed my arm on his shoulder and upper torso with the intent to keep my body weight on top of him as he was still actively pushing against me and trying to get up off the ground. I was very cognizant of the fact that this was a juvenile that I was dealing with, and I was taking precautions to not cause injury or any pain to the male. The male did not follow my command to "stop" and continued to attempt to get up. I kept my arm around his upper torso only to keep balance on top of the male and keep him on the ground. I was also cognizant of the positioning of my arm and tried to readjust my positioning when I felt my arm was getting too close to the male's neck region at one point. I never applied any pressure to the male's neck. I did not under any circumstances try to restrict or impede his breathing in any way.

I asked the male several times after the incident if he was injured, as his safety and well-being were of primary concern to me. He stated he was not injured and declined to be seen by EMS. I asked him if he would agree to the school nurse checking on him as a precaution, and he agreed to that. The school nurse came and briefly examined him in

my presence, and did not observe any injuries. At no point in time did the male state he could not breathe or that he was in pain.

Administrative Interview with MCSO Deputy (SRO) Michael Hand:

On 05/10/24 at approximately 1230 hours I interviewed Deputy Michael Hand in reference to this incident. I provided Deputy Hand with a Subject Notification, which I read to him and he stated he understood. The following is a summary of the interview and is not a verbatim transcript. The interview was audio and video recorded and the recording has been added to this case file.

I asked Deputy Hand if he recalled working on the date I referenced in his Subject Notification (04/24/24) and he told me he did. Deputy Hand told me he was working as the School Resource Officer at Central High School on that date. Deputy Hand further added the SRO Unit is his assigned unit and Central High School is his assigned school. I asked if he recalled handling some type of altercation in the parking lot around 1230 hours and he told me he did. I told Deputy Hand that was the portion of the day which I was needing to talk with him about, and asked that he tell me about the incident.

Overall, Deputy Hand's recollection of events was very much consistent with what he outlined in his supplemental report and what I observed in my video footage review. Again, Deputy Hand's supplemental report was pasted towards the beginning of this investigative summary.

Deputy Hand told me throughout the morning of 04/24/24, he had been completing reports and other paperwork in order to drop it off at that MCSO later in the day. Deputy Hand told me he had also been completing other paperwork which he needed to drop off at the court house later in the day as well.

Deputy Hand explained he had completed all of his needed paperwork and was ready to head towards to the MCSO and courthouse, however he wasn't intending on leaving until after all the students at Central High had returned from lunch. Deputy Hand said when school starts, at lunch time, and when school ends are the busiest times of day with those times being the periods when almost all of the students are out of class and wandering around the campus. Deputy Hand said those timeframes are when they (SRO's) try to always be on campus and as available as possible in the event some kind of situation presents itself. Because of the timing, Deputy Hand told me his intention was to take his paperwork to the MCSO and courthouse around 1300 hours, once all the students returned from lunch.

Deputy Hand told me while finishing up his paperwork in the SRO office, he recalled Deputy Peterson stepping out of their office. Deputy Hand said he wasn't sure where Deputy Peterson went to, but assumed he either went to the main administration office or went to take care of something else. Deputy Hand said a short time later, an unknown female student briefly stopped by the SRO office and told Deputy Hand there was a fight in the parking lot. Deputy Hand told me he exited the SRO office and began walking towards the main entrance / exit of the school. Deputy Hand explained at about that time he realized his school radio was still in the SRO office, but he elected to continue outside towards the parking lot instead of turning back to go get his school radio. Deputy Hand

said while walking towards the front doors of the school, he used his MCSO radio to tell Deputy Peterson he needed his assistance in the parking lot.

Deputy Hand said as he exited the building he didn't notice any kind of obvious altercation taking place anywhere but did notice school administrators walking towards the north east corner of the parking lot. Deputy Hand said he proceeded that way as well and he thought by that time Deputy Peterson had also exited the school and was walking nearby him.

Deputy Hand said as they approached the east side of the parking lot they observed several students walking away from the area. He said he also recalled two school administrators, Vern MaGee and Shawna Hobbs near where the students appeared to be walking away from. Deputy Hand said at that time he and Deputy Peterson began talking to the Central High School Wrestling coach, Clint Trujillo. Deputy Hand said they spoke with Coach Trujillo on the north side of the bus loop / fire lane and he told them he never observed any kind of altercation taking place, but rather just some yelling and screaming back and forth between the groups of students.

Deputy Hand told me a short time later the school administrators began walking back towards the main entrance of the school and he and Deputy Peterson began following Shawna Hobbs as she was escorting two female students who had continued to argue with her. Deputy Hand said as they walked back to the main entrance of the school he remembered hearing several different students yelling and screaming at them, and also at the school administrators. Deputy Hand said he didn't recall any specific statements the students were making, but just heard them yelling; which Deputy Hand explained was common and not out of the ordinary.

Deputy Hand said just before he got to the front steps outside the main entrance of the school, he heard what he described as being a "different type of noise". Deputy Hand said he couldn't describe the type of noise he heard, but just recalled it being different than the yelling and screaming he had been hearing from the students. Deputy Hand explained the different type of noise caught his attention for some reason and because of such he turned to his right and upon doing so, he observed Deputy Peterson to be physically struggling with a student. Deputy Hand said he had no idea what was going on at the time, but thought he recalled seeing what he described as different pieces of Deputy Peterson's equipment falling off his body and "flying all over the place".


Deputy Hand told me he immediately began moving towards Deputy Peterson and as he approached him he drew his taser. Deputy Hand said upon approaching Deputy Peterson, he still had no idea what was going on but it was clear to him Deputy Peterson was attempting to get the student to stop struggling. Deputy Hand said he wasn't sure if the student () had assaulted Deputy Peterson or someone else, or what the reason was for Deputy Peterson to be struggling with him, but he also noticed there to be several students encircling them. Deputy Hand said the only thing clear to him at the time was that Deputy Peterson was trying to get the male student detained, and the male student seemed like he was physically resisting Deputy Peterson as he wasn't lying on his stomach and it seemed like he kept trying to stand up. Deputy Hand told me he pulled his taser out because he knew from his experience in the MCDF (jail) that sometimes just the simple sight of the taser and threat of being tased makes people comply, and he also said it was the least amount of force he felt he could offer to the situation at the time.

Deputy Hand said he began pointing the taser at the male's chest and yelling at him to lie down or he would be tased. Deputy Hand said the male student then laid on his stomach just a few seconds later and Deputy Peterson placed him in handcuffs.

Deputy Hand said while Deputy Peterson was placing the male student into handcuffs and asking him about any injuries he remembered what he felt to be several students getting closer and closer to them. Deputy Hand said he specifically remembered a female student named standing just a few feet away from him and remembered her yelling and the only thing he remembered her yelling was something about recording. Deputy Hand said he then thought he remembered school administrator Shawna Hobbs telling to either step away, leave or go to class and instead of doing so, he remembered either staying where she was or possibly taking a step or two towards him and Deputy Peterson. Deputy Hand said around that time he to leave the area or she would be charged for obstruction. Deputy velled at Hand said he thought around that time started to step back and away from the immediate area. Upon further clarification, Deputy Hand said he was aware it wasn't illegal for anyone to record the incident, but he was also aware if was against school policies and rules for students to record fights. Deputy Hand told me, had he chosen to with obstruction, it would have been for her constantly getting too close to him and Deputy Peterson while they were dealing with the male student Deputy Peterson was trying to detain.

Deputy Hand explained just after yelling at students, he felt the presence of even more students around them so he began standing up and yelling at all the other students around them to leave the area and get out of their scene. Deputy Hand said he thought he recalled possibly pointing his taser towards some of the other students while standing up and trying to re-holster his taser, and yelling at the other students, but he wasn't sure if he had in fact pointed his taser towards anyone else besides the male student Deputy Peterson was detaining. Deputy Hand said he never had any intention of pointing his taser towards anyone else at that time; (Of note, the video footage I reviewed captured all of Deputy Hand's actions he had described and there was no footage which depicted him pointing his taser at anyone besides

Deputy Hand said he recalled the majority of the other students to begin walking away from the area but then remembered hearing some kind of "chatter" from a male student and he recognized the student's voice to be that of . Deputy Hand said he couldn't tell exactly what was saying but it seemed as though he was trying to provoke other students. Deputy Hand told me he's known and his sister, for some time now though them being students at Central High School and him being the SRO. Deputy Hand said towards the grandfather and beginning of the year he had a meeting with and legal guardian, ; and during that meeting, told Deputy Hand to contact him at any was being disrespectful, out of control, or otherwise point in which not obeying rules. Deputy Hand told me, with his relationship with . coupled with seeming as if he was trying to provoke some other type of disturbance or alteration in the parking lot, he (Deputy Hand), approached and directed him to go to the office where they were going to call his grandfather,



after being told there was a fight in the parking lot. Deputy Hand said his initial thought was to walk outside and ensure there was some kind of incident taking place before activating his body-worn camera, but then upon getting outside and noticing there was no longer any kind of altercation he forgot about his body-worn camera as he was just talking with school staff and walking back to the office. Deputy Hand admitted he should have activated his body-worn camera upon leaving his office and walking outside as he agreed it's better to have to label an accidental recording then to not have a recording at

all. Deputy Hand said he understood his body-worn camera mistake was solely his fault and he felt he let the MCSO down by not activating his body-worn camera which ultimately prevented the MCSO from having the video footage they would otherwise have had.

I asked Deputy Hand if he felt he was in full control of his emotions and actions during this incident and without hesitation he stated he did feel he had full control of his emotions and actions. Deputy Hand told me he understood he yelled and screamed at students, but again stated he felt his tone and attitude was needed due to the large number or students in the area and the fact some of them weren't complying with staff members' orders and directions.

I told Deputy Hand there were some concerning comments and discussions between him and Deputy Peterson in the Central High School office following the incident. I explained these comments were him and Deputy Peterson talking about the incident, and more specifically appearing to boast to each other about the incident. I also explained one of the other comments was him (Deputy Hand) yelling at two female students who were laughing at him and telling them he was going to charge them with everything he could throw at them. I told Deputy Hand no one else appeared to be present for the conversations between him and Deputy Peterson, but they were captured on both of their body-worn cameras. I explained however, there were other staff members in the office when he yelled at the two female students. I explained these comments, mainly the tone and context of the comments, could very easily cause the public to cast a poor view onto not only the MCSO but the law enforcement profession as a whole. Deputy Hand told me he understands they're held to a higher standard and should not be talking in any kind of way, or making any kind of comments which the public would look negatively upon.

I asked Deputy Hand if there was anything else about the incident which he remembered and he told me there was not. I asked Deputy Hand to contact me if he happened to remember anything further and he told me he would. Our conversation / interview ended a short time later.

Administrative Interview with MCSO Deputy (SRO) Phillip Peterson:

On 05/10/24 at approximately 1515 hours I interviewed Deputy Phillip Peterson in reference to this incident. I provided Deputy Peterson with a Subject Notification, which I read to him and he stated he understood. The following is a summary of the interview and is not a verbatim transcript. The interview was audio and video recorded and the recording has been added to this case file.

I asked Deputy Peterson if he recalled working on the date I referenced in his Subject Notification (04/24/24) and he told me he did. Deputy Peterson confirmed he was working as the School Resource Officer at Central High School on that date, and further added that's his assigned unit and assigned school. I asked if he recalled handling some type of altercation in the parking lot around 1230 hours and he told me he did. I explained to Deputy Peterson that was the portion of the day which I was needing to talk with him about, and asked that he tell me about the incident.


Overall, Deputy Peterson's recollection of events was very much consistent with what he outlined in his report and what I observed in my video footage review. Again, Deputy Peterson's report was pasted towards the beginning of this investigative summary.

Deputy Peterson started by telling me the initial verbal altercation in the parking lot which started everything, was actually started a couple days prior when Central High School administrators received one or two Safe2Tell tips about some female students possibly looking to fight another female student. Deputy Peterson said from what he recalled, he believed the information in the Safe2Tell was limited but there was mention of a female student named, possibly being the instigator. Deputy Peterson said for a day or two before the incident on 04/24/24, school administrators had been keeping an eye on the different groups to see if any further details presented themselves as they didn't want to create issues by just "calling out" anyone or everyone.

Deputy Peterson continued by telling me that on, 04/24/24, around the lunch period, he had left their SRO office and went to use the restroom down the hall. Deputy Peterson said while finishing up in the restroom he heard Deputy Hand ask for his assistance via his MCSO radio. Deputy Peterson told me he thought he recalled Deputy Hand telling him he needed him in the parking lot. Deputy Peterson said he exited the restroom and began walking towards the main entrance / exit of the school. Deputy Peterson said as he exited the school he was either right behind Deputy Hand or fairly close to being beside him from what he recalled. Deputy Peterson said and they were walking into the parking lot, Deputy Hand told him a female student stopped by their office and told him there was a fight going on in the parking lot. Deputy Peterson said as they got into the parking lot they started walking east bound because that's where several students seemed to be walking away from and that's also where several school administrators and staff members were located.


Deputy Peterson said as they got to the east end of the parking lot they noticed there wasn't any kind of active fight going on so he and Deputy Hand began talking with the wrestling coach, Clint Trujillo. Deputy Peterson said coach Trujillo told them he had come outside and never noticed any kind of physical altercation but did notice two groups of students to be arguing with each other just across the bus / fire lane from where they were standing. Deputy Peterson said a short time later Administrator Shawna Hobbs began walking a couple female students back towards the office and while doing so, she told Deputy Peterson she could use their help because she was pretty sure the primary instigator of the altercation was and she had reportedly got into a vehicle in the bus loop after dispersing the area. Deputy Peterson said Shawna told them she expected to be very uncooperative with coming to the office.


Deputy Peterson explained he and Deputy Hand then proceeded to start walking back towards the main entrance of the school as they followed Shawna Hobbs. Deputy Peterson said he recalled around this same time frame that he tried to contact dispatch via his radio to see whether or not he and Deputy Hand had created a call for service for either the altercation or an assist to the school administrators. Deputy Peterson told me he couldn't remember if his radio was having technical issues with going through to dispatch or if he stopped trying to contact dispatch because while doing so, his attention became focused on a group of students who had formed on the sidewalk behind where he, Deputy Hand, and Shawna Hobbs were located.






I asked Deputy Peterson why his body-worn camera wasn't activated upon walking outside to investigate the initial altercation. Deputy Peterson sighed for a brief second before telling me he was trying to prolong activating his body-worn camera because he knew the prior thirty second window of video recording upon activating it would have captured him using the restroom because he didn't turn his body-worn camera off while going to the restroom. Deputy Peterson said once he was outside in the parking lot and outside the thirty second window of his body-worn camera capturing the prior thirty seconds, they had determined there was no active altercation taking place and that's why he didn't activate it once they were outside. Deputy Peterson told me, looking back, it was a mistake to not turn his body-worn camera off while in the rest room and subsequently not activate it upon walking outside when his assistance was requested by Deputy Hand. Deputy Peterson agreed body-worn camera footage of any type is better than not having any at all. I explained body-worn camera footage can always be redacted, especially for situations where the footage captures someone using the rest room or conducting otherwise unrelated business. Deputy Peterson told me he understood.







I told Deputy Peterson there were some concerning comments and discussions between him and Deputy Hand in the Central High School office following the incident. I explained these comments were him and Deputy Hand talking about the incident, and more specifically appearing to boast to each other about the incident. I told Deputy Peterson no one else appeared to be present for the conversations between him and Deputy Hand, but they were captured on both of their body-worn cameras. I explained these comments, mainly the tone and context of the comments, could very easily cause the public to cast a poor view onto not only the MCSO but the law enforcement profession as a whole. Deputy Peterson told me he understands he's looked higher upon, especially with working as an SRO and he knows he's held to a higher standard and should not be talking in any kind of way, or making any kind of comments which would look negative to the public.

I asked Deputy Peterson if there was anything else about the incident which he remembered and he told me there was not. I asked Deputy Peterson to contact me if he happened to remember anything further and he told me he would. Our conversation / interview ended a short time later.

Additional CIRT Communication / Information (05/16/24 @ 1600 hours):

On 05/16/24 at approximately 1600 hours, GJPD Detective McCullough advised the CIRT would not be having GJPD Commander Fisher conduct a use of force review for the incident. Det. McCullough also advised they had initially reached out to a Use of Force Subject Matter Expert in the Denver, Colorado area; however, upon asking him if he'd be willing to conduct a use of force review for this incident he declined the request, noting, "liability reasons".

GJPD's CIRT Investigation Summary (GJPD: 24-20509):

On 05/24/24, GJPD Detective Zach McCullough advised the CIRT had completed the investigation of this incident. Det. McCullough subsequently provided me with the CIRT case file for this investigation, and also advised of providing the same case file to 21st Judicial District Attorney Daniel Rubinstein. The CIRT case file contained Det. McCullough's "Case Summary" of the CIRT investigation.

The following are copy and pasted excerpts from Det. McCullough's CIRT case summary. The only portions of Det. McCullough's case summary which have not been copy and pasted below are portions of information which have already been previously detailed in this investigative summary (ex. Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's reports, and video footage reviews). The entire CIRT case file has been added to this case.

Use of Force (Central High School, 550 Warrior Way): Investigative Summary Grand Junction Police Department Case #2024-00020509 Mesa County Sheriff's Office Case # 2024-00013598 Detective Zachary McCullough

The 21st Judicial Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) was activated to investigate a use of force incident that occurred on April 24, 2024. This report contains information that was obtained from witness interviews, body worn camera, law enforcement reports, and other video footage.


On April 24th, 2024, Deputy Peterson was notified of a large crowd in front of Central High School (CHS) and there was possibly a fight occurring. Deputy Hand was notified by an unknown student that there was a large fight going on in the parking lot. Both Deputies are School Resource Officers (SRO) at CHS.

A use of force involving Deputy Peterson and occurred during the response to the reported incident in the parking lot. Interview On 05/07/2024 was interviewed at his residence; his legal guardian was present. Also present via video chat was the family's attorney, James Roberts (Palmer Perlstein Attorneys & Counselors). The following is a summary statement. A transcript has been provided of the complete interview, for additional detail review the transcript and or body worn camera video. retuned to the school during lunch with They were originally going up and go to McDonald's. had been arguing and with each other and were going to fight. From his understanding the issue between them was that was going around telling people that had asked her for nude photographs. to come to the school. came and started pushing and said when initially drove past them in the truck, that flashed what he believed to be a handgun or something of similar size/shape color to a handgun. went over and started arguing with . The cops came outside of the school and he was still arguing with said, "who cares n-word", . When he said that was directed toward not the cop. 





recounted some of the initial altercation between the various students in the parking lot.
said he witnessed the incident between law enforcement and said the cop was walking away from them and their mouths at each other. Called the "N" word and the cop took offense to that for some reason.
The officer grabbed and started to take him to the office. Stook a step to the right and the officer grabbed around the neck and tackled him to the ground. After the officer had so on the ground, had his arms out to side to show he was not trying to fight. The other cop ran up and had the taser to chest. Got got scared and laid down on the ground.
(Student):
recounted some of the initial altercation between the various students in the parking lot.
After the two groups separated in the parking lot, said the comment was likely directed at the other kids and not Deputy Peterson. Deputy Peterson approached graduaters, grabbed his arm, and told him to go to the school office.
believed intended to go to the office with Deputy Peterson, but did not want Deputy Peterson to touch him. shrugged Deputy Peterson's hand off his arm, described it as being non-combative.
Deputy Petersen then "grabbed him () by the throat and slammed him on the ground". Said was attempted to cooperate, but Deputy Peterson's leg was on leg so he was unable to move onto the ground as directed. Said Deputy Peterson took his body-worn camera off during the altercation. Deputy Hand then came and pulled out his Taser. Thought Deputy Hand was attempting to tase , even though he was cooperative.
did not think was injured at all during the incident. said said had a bruise on his leg from a prior injury and that Deputy Peterson placed his knee on the bruise during the incident.
(Student):
recounted some of the initial altercation between the various students in the parking lot.
said she witnessed the incident between Deputy Peterson and heard say, "Who cares nigga". was not sure who the comment was directed to. explained the word "nigga" was commonly used by kids in her age





Deputy Hand came over to the area with his taser and told was used "comply or you will get tased". Was then placed in handcuffs. Vern said he did not know exactly why was upset or the specific reason Deputy Peterson had to use force.
Clint Trujillo (School Staff):
Clint was in the weight room when a group of students approached him and said there was a potential fight between a large group of students. Clint looked outside and saw around twenty students gathered in the parking lot. Lunch had just ended and the two groups were starting to disperse. As the groups were dispersing, they were still verbally fighting with each other.
Clint saw Deputy Peterson come outside and it looked like he was telling the kids to disperse. Several more school administrators came outside as well. Clint believed the incident was under control and started to return to the weight room. Clint saw Deputy Peterson talking to three male students, one was wearing a white shirt, one was wearing a red shirt, and the other was wearing a black shirt. Deputy Peterson would speak to the students, walk away for a short distance, then speak with them again.
Clint said one of the students was "mouthing off" and cussing at Deputy Peterson. Clint did not provide a description of the physical incident between Deputy Peterson.
(Student):
said there was an ongoing problem between a group of female students. identified the females as, and and
provided further detail about what led up to the incident in the parking lot. said after the two groups split up, she was standing in front of the school. turned and saw being "tackled to the ground". could hear being disrespectful toward Deputy Peterson and heard say "get off me nigga". said Deputy Peterson was trying to get hands behind his back, she could see was holding his hands up. Said Deputy Hand arrived with his taser out and was then handcuffed.
(Student):
was not present for the initial altercation between the two groups of students in the parking lot. When got there the two groups had moved from the parking lot and were around the front of the school. went to find her "adopted sister" because she wanted to keep from getting in any trouble.
was told by another student that was told one group of students was using racial slurs such as "beaners" and "niggers". "group" went to Shauna Hobbs and told her what was going on.



Summary


On 04/24/2024, at approximately 1224 hours, Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson went to the parking lot of Central High School in response to the report of an altercation occurring between students. A review of video footage and witness statements found probable cause that several students committed the crime of disorderly conduct, prior to Deputy Hand and Deputy Peterson arriving outside.

The initial altercation between students occurred on the northeast side of the parking lot. By the time Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand came outside, the two groups had mostly separated. One of the groups had moved to the area around a black truck that was parked in front of the school, the other group was a little bit to the east of the truck on the sidewalk.

Members of each group were still verbally arguing with each other. Shauna Hobbs (Assistant Principal) was outside and requested Deputy Peterson/Deputy Hand to assist her with contacting a female who was known to be uncooperative.

Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand walked past the group on the east side of the sidewalk. As they were walking past the group, Deputy Peterson reported hearing someone in the group yelling something like, "hit her peterson,", hit her". Deputy Peterson felt the group was trying to provoke violence. Deputy Peterson turned to the group and told them to "knock it off".

Deputy Peterson turned around and started walking west bound on the sidewalk again. Deputy Peterson noted a male from the group Deputy Peterson told to knock it off said, "what nigga". A review of video footage of the incident found the male said, "Who, who,

21st Judicial District Attorney's Findings of Fact Letter (Daniel Rubinstein):

On 06/13/24 at approximately 0930 hours MCSO Command Staff advised me they had received a formal phone call from 21st Judicial District Attorney Daniel Rubinstein. DA Rubinstein advised he had reviewed the CIRT case related to this incident, in its entirety and concluded that, based on the totality of the circumstances surrounding the incident, the 21st Judicial District Attorney's Office would not be filling charges against Deputy Peterson nor Deputy Hand for their respective involvement(s) in this case. DA Rubinstein further advised he was anticipating a delay in having his formal Findings of Fact letter for the case completed and sent to the MCSO. Due to this delay, DA Rubinstein wished to at least verbally notify MCSO Command Staff of his findings regarding the case, so MCSO Command could proceed accordingly regarding this internal investigation.


Once DA Rubinstein's formal Findings of Fact letter is received it will be added to this internal case file.

Investigation Findings:

This Department – Citizen Complaint Investigation was initiated by the MCSO's Professional Standards Unit immediately following the reception of information from
and his wife, on 04/25/24. The information and are provided, pertained to a use of force incident at Central High School on 04/24/24, which involved MCSO Deputies (School Resource Officer's) Phillip Peterson and Michael Hand.
In their own words, and respective allegations pertained to the following key points:
 Deputy Peterson tackled to the ground, placed him in a choke-hold, handcuffed him, and used excessive force in doing so. Deputy Hand threatened to tase , and did so in a manner, both physically and verbally, which appeared to be out of control. Deputy Hand yelled at their "daughter" , and threatened to criminally charge her with obstruction for being near the altercation and recording the incident on her cell phone.
and allegations, which, if true and factual, would amount to violations of MCSO Policies and Procedures, as well as potential violations of state law.

Were the actions taken by Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand within the standards and policies established by the agency?

- 1. Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand had legal and lawful standing at the scene / school as they were asked by school administration to assist with investigating a reported fight that was either taking place or took place on school property. Both MCSO Deputies were also assigned School Resource Officers at the time of the investigation as well.
- 2. As Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand proceeded across the parking lot they discovered the reported altercation to have since stopped. This was also relayed to both Deputies by school administrators and staff members as Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand approached the area where the altercation was said to have taken place.
- 3. Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand were asked by Administrator Hobbs to remain close by and monitor the area while school administrators and staff members gathered involved students and escorted them to the office.
- 4. While remaining in the area and attempting to keep the peace through "Officer Presence", several students continued arguing with school staff members. During this timeframe, one student, began yelling at another student to hit someone. At the time, Deputy Peterson believed this comment was that of telling another student to hit Administrator Hobbs; however, regardless of who the comment(s) were directed at, Deputy Peterson believed was intentionally provoking violence. Deputy Peterson verbally addressed , telling him to "knock it off". continued with his comments, and yelled, "Who cares Nigga". Deputy Peterson advised of establishing Probable Cause at this point for charging with at least Disorderly Conduct. 5. Deputy Peterson attempted to escort to the office and away from the other students, and while doing so, pulled away from Deputy Peterson. Rather than pulling away and leaving the area, or at least the immediate vicinity of Deputy Peterson and the other subjects, remained in close proximity to Deputy Peterson which led Deputy Peterson to believe was intending on using physical force and/or some form of violence against him. Due to this, Deputy Peterson felt



- 9. Deputy Peterson continually struggled with getting to the ground and appeared to only comply and go to the ground once Deputy Hand arrived, directed his taser at person, and told to get on the ground or he would be tased.
- 10. Deputy Hand admitted to yelling and screaming at other students in the area as he felt they were getting too close to the incident and creating a safety risk for him and Deputy Peterson. Deputy Hand advised of the need to yell based on the situation, and felt that a less direct approach / tone would not have achieved the goal of getting the students to leave the immediate area.
- 11. Deputy Hand also admitted to yelling at during the incident, and stating he would charge her with Obstruction. Deputy Hand advised the charge, had not cooperated, would have been for getting too close to them when directed to stay back; rather than it seeming as if he was going to charge her for recording the incident on her cell phone.
- 12. Both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand admitted to their conversation / comments to each other following the incident as not being professional, nor casting a positive light on not only them, but the MCSO and the law enforcement profession as a whole.
- 13. Deputy Hand admitted to his comment of, yelling at the female students laughing at him and stating he was going to charge them with everything he could throw at them, as casting the same negative light on not only him, but the MCSO and law enforcement profession as a whole.

After a thorough review of this incident; including information gathered from CIRT briefings, reviewing the related CIRT and MCSO reports, conducting and reviewing interviews, and reviewing all pertinent camera footage; I find that Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand did not act outside of the scope of MCSO policy and procedure, Federal Law, or Colorado Law in regards to their actions of using and/or displaying force during this incident. I do however, find both Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand violated the MCSO's Body-Worn Camera policy and procedure, as well as the MCSO's Standards of Conduct policy.

The Mesa County Sheriff's Office has established an expectation, through policy, procedure, and training, for members to make decisions that are both within the law and policy. The decisions should be made to limit any liability of the agency and to the employee(s). When applying Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's conduct during this incident to the use of their respective body-worn cameras; and their use of obscene,

indecent, profane or derogatory language; I find that said conduct on both of their behalves does not fall within the established standards of the MCSO's Body-Worn Camera and Standards of Conduct policies / procedures.

When comparing the totality of the circumstances surrounding this investigation; coupled with Deputy Peterson and Deputy Hand's actions during the incident, to MCSO Policies and Procedures; the applicable policies and procedures include the following:

- Use of Force (MCSO Policy 300)
- Handcuffing and Restraints (MCSO Policy 302)
- > Standards of Conduct (MCSO Policy 320)
- > Body-Worn Camera (MCSO Policy 421)
- > Body-Worn Camera (MCSO Procedure 321)

When applying these noted MCSO Policies and Procedures to my investigation, I find the following dispositions to apply:

- Exonerated Use of Force (MCSO Policy 300) When the investigation discloses the alleged act occurred, but the act was justified, lawful, and/or proper.
- > Exonerated Handcuffing and Restraints (MCSO Policy 302) When the investigation discloses the alleged act occurred, but the act was justified, lawful, and/or proper.
- Sustained Standards of Conduct (MCSO Policy 320) When the investigation discloses sufficient evidence to establish the act occurred, and it constituted misconduct.
- Sustained Body-Worn Camera (MCSO Policy 421) When the investigation discloses sufficient evidence to establish the act occurred, and it constituted misconduct.
- Sustained Body-Worn Camera (MCSO Procedure 321) When the investigation discloses sufficient evidence to establish the act occurred, and it constituted misconduct.

MCSO Policy 300 – Use of Force:

300.2.1 DUTY TO INTERVENE AND REPORT

Any deputy present and observing another law enforcement officer or a member using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intervene to prevent the use of unreasonable force.

300.2.3 PERSPECTIVE

When observing or reporting force used by a law enforcement officer, each deputy should take into account the totality of the circumstances and the possibility that other

law enforcement officers may have additional information regarding the threat posed by the subject.

300.3 - USE OF FORCE

Deputies shall use only that amount of force that reasonably appears necessary given the facts and circumstances perceived by the deputy at the time of the event to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

The reasonableness of force will be judged from the perspective of a reasonable deputy on the scene at the time of the incident. Any evaluation of reasonableness must allow for the fact that deputies are often forced to make split-second decisions about the amount of force that reasonably appears necessary in a particular situation, with limited information and in circumstances that are tense, uncertain, and rapidly evolving. Given that no policy can realistically predict every possible situation a deputy might encounter, deputies are entrusted to use well-reasoned discretion in determining the appropriate use of force in each incident.

It is also recognized that circumstances may arise in which deputies reasonably believe that it would be impractical or ineffective to use any of the tools, weapons, or methods provided by this office. Deputies may find it more effective or reasonable to improvise their response to rapidly unfolding conditions that they are confronting. In such circumstances, the use of any improvised device or method must nonetheless be reasonable and utilized only to the degree that reasonably appears necessary to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

While the ultimate objective of every law enforcement encounter is to avoid or minimize injury, nothing in this policy requires a deputy to retreat or be exposed to possible physical injury before applying reasonable force.

300.3.2 - FACTORS USED TO DETERMINE THE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE

When determining whether to apply force and evaluating whether a deputy has used reasonable force, a number of factors should be taken into consideration, as time and circumstances permit. These factors include but are not limited to:

- a. Immediacy and severity of the threat to deputies or others.
- b. The conduct of the individual being confronted, as reasonably perceived by the deputy at the time.
- c. Deputy/subject factors (e.g., age, size, relative strength, skill level, injuries sustained, level of exhaustion or fatigue, the number of deputies available vs. subjects).
- d. The effects of suspected drug or alcohol use.
- e. The individual's mental state or capacity.
- f. The individual's ability to understand and comply with deputy commands.
- g. Proximity of weapons or dangerous improvised devices.
- h. The degree to which the individual has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to resist despite being restrained.
- i. The availability of other reasonable and feasible options and their possible effectiveness.
- j. Seriousness of the suspected offense or reason for contact with the individual.
- k. Training and experience of the deputy.

- I. Potential for injury to deputies, suspects and others.
- m. Whether the individual appears to be resisting, attempting to evade arrest by flight, or is attacking the deputy.
- n. The risk and reasonably foreseeable consequences of escape.
- o. The apparent need for immediate control of the individual or a prompt resolution of the situation.
- p. Whether the conduct of the individual being confronted no longer reasonably appears to pose an imminent threat to the deputy or others.
- q. Prior contacts with the individual or awareness of any propensity for violence.
- r. Any other exigent circumstances.

300.3.6 - PROHIBITION ON CHOKEHOLDS

A deputy is prohibited from using a chokehold upon another person. A chokehold is defined as a method by which a person applies sufficient pressure to a person to make breathing difficult or impossible. It also includes pressure to stop the flow of blood to the brain via the carotid arteries (CRS § 18-1-707).

MCSO Policy 302 – Handcuffing and Restraints:

302.3 - USE OF RESTRAINTS

Only members who have successfully completed Mesa County Sheriff's Office-approved training on the use of restraint devices described in this policy are authorized to use these devices.

When deciding whether to use any restraint, deputies should carefully balance officer safety concerns with factors that include, but are not limited to:

- The circumstances or crime leading to the arrest.
- The demeanor and behavior of the arrested person.
- The age and health of the person.
- Whether the person is known to be pregnant.
- Whether the person has a hearing or speaking disability. In such cases, consideration should be given, safety permitting, to handcuffing to the front in order to allow the person to sign or write notes.
- Whether the person has any other apparent disability.

302.3.1 - RESTRAINT OF DETAINEES

Situations may arise where it may be reasonable to restrain an individual who may, after brief investigation, be released without arrest. Unless arrested, the use of restraints on detainees should continue only for as long as is reasonably necessary to assure the safety of deputies and others. When deciding whether to remove restraints from a detainee, deputies should continuously weigh the safety interests at hand against the continuing intrusion upon the detainee.

302.3.3 - RESTRAINT OF JUVENILES

A juvenile under 14 years of age should not be restrained unless the juvenile is suspected of a dangerous felony or when the deputy has a reasonable suspicion that the juvenile may resist, attempt escape, injure themselves, injure the deputy, or damage property.

A school resource officer or a law enforcement officer acting in the officer's official capacity on school grounds, in a school vehicle, or at a school activity or sanctioned event shall not use handcuffs on any student, unless there is a danger to themselves or others or handcuffs are used during a custodial arrest that requires transport.(CRS § 26-20-111).

MCSO Policy 320 – Standards of Conduct:

320.5.8 - PERFORMANCE

- e. Disparaging remarks or conduct concerning duly constituted authority to the extent that such conduct disrupts the efficiency of this office or subverts the good order, efficiency and discipline of this office or that would tend to discredit any of its members.
- i. Any act on- or off-duty that brings discredit to this office.

320.5.9 - CONDUCT

- g. Use of obscene, indecent, profane or derogatory language while on-duty or in uniform.
- m. Any other on or off-duty conduct which any member knows or reasonably should know is unbecoming a member of this office, is contrary to good order, efficiency or morale, or tends to reflect unfavorably upon this office or its members.

MCSO Policy 421 – Body-Worn Camera:

421.6 - ACTIVATION OF THE BODY-WORN CAMERA (CRS 24-21-902)

All agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera recording device will activate the camera immediately upon the following:

- When arriving at a call for service, received through central dispatch or self-dispatched.
- Responding to assist another officer on a call for service.
- Any self-initiated contact with a member of the public, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law.
- Any interview or interrogation conducted at a location other recording devices are not available.
- All traffic contacts.
- All welfare checks.
- Any other time the deputy feels the recording may transition to a contact, as previously defined.

MCSO Procedure 301 Body-Worn Camera:

301.6 - BODY-WORN CAMERA ACTIVATION REQUIREMENTS

All agency members required to wear a Body-Worn Camera recording device will activate the camera immediately upon the following:

- When arriving at a call for service, received through central dispatch or self-dispatched.
- Responding to assist another officer on a call for service.
- Any self-initiated contact with a member of the public, for the purpose of enforcing the law or investigating possible violations of the law.

<u>Deputy (SRO) Phillip Peterson Disciplinary History - (Use of Force):</u>

 Deputy Peterson has not received any counseling or other forms of discipline during his employment at the MCSO.

<u>Deputy (SRO) Michael Hand Disciplinary History - (Use of Force):</u>

• Deputy Hand received a verbal counseling in September of 2023 for a case he handled and/or was involved in during the same month. In that case, Deputy Hand was working a security assignment at Stocker Stadium for a high school football game. An altercation between students took place and several students were asked to leave the property. One of the students refused to leave, even after District Security Officers told the student they would be charged for trespassing. Deputy Hand subsequently placed the student in handcuffs but never charged the student with trespassing or any other crime; rather, Deputy Hand released the student to their parent(s). Deputy Hand received verbal counseling and training regarding emotional intelligence, and understanding the need for the application of force and/or handcuffs. - Guardian Tracking Case: 11231.

We have requested that the Grand Junction Police Department activate the 21st Judicial District Critical Incident Response Team to conduct a criminal investigation into this incident. Additionally, this incident is being investigated internally, by our Professional Standards Unit.

Effective immediately, you are being placed on paid administrative leave. The fact you are being placed on leave should not be construed to indicate any inference of quilt or innocence, but is done strictly for your protection and protection of the agency pending the outcome of the investigation.

You have the right to retain an attorney, but the attorney cannot he present during any administrative interview. I strongly encourage you to not discuss the details of the incident with anyone other than your attorney, any assigned criminal investigator or the assigned Professional Standards Investigator. You are specifically ordered not discuss the details of the incident with Deputy Michael Hand.

During the course of this leave, you are required to be available by telephone (personal cellphone, department issued cellphone or landline) between 0800hrs and 1700hrs Monday through Friday and available to respond to the Sheriff's Office within two hours of notification.

As a part of the administrative leave process, at this time, I will be collecting your ID/proximity card and your department issued firearms.

During the course of this leave, you are not to be at the Sheriff's Office, at Central High School, or at any Sheriff's Office sponsored event unless specifically requested by a member of our Professional Standards Unit, by me or by the Undersheriff.
